Why Coaches Education?

Interscholastic athletic programs in South Dakota are an extension of the classroom. Athletics have been valued in our society for teaching traditional American values such as competition (achievement, motivation), sportsmanship (ethical behavior), leadership and building character. Competition is highly valued because through competitive experiences in sports, young people can develop ethical behavior. They can learn a basic code of sportsmanship that transfers to a moral code for living. In competitive sports, where winning is a valued prize, opportunities for making moral decisions reflecting fairness, integrity and sense of ethics often occur.

The development of young people with quality leadership skills has always been an important goal of sports. Young people must understand that every member, regardless of skill or talent, has a role to play in a successful team effort. No one wins or loses alone. It takes skilled coaches to counteract a message popularized by the media that it is the “star” that makes a team successful.

At the heart of the high school sports experience is the quality of coaching provided to student athletes. A key element of having high quality coaching is ensuring that coaches have proper and ongoing training.

Young people will experience the positive outcomes of athletic participation only if they have a qualified coach. A well-qualified coach knows how to plan dynamic practice sessions, teaches sound fundamentals with good learning progressions and plans training programs appropriate for the sport. Successful coaches communicate with their athletes effectively and understand the kind of positive motivational approaches that result in achievement. Athletes who receive good coaching will also be injured less frequently. As a consequence, they will have more opportunities to experience the excitement and receive the positive values of athletic competition, while performing at their best possible level.

SDHSAA Coaches Education Program

The table below shows the SDHSAA coaches education requirements for all high school coaches as required by the Activities Association and/or Administrative Rules of South Dakota (ARSD).

The changes to the 2017 Certification Rules now require NFHS courses to be completed prior to issuance of the permit.

ARSD 24:28:09:18. Athletic coaching permit eligibility requirements. An athletic coaching permit is issued to an applicant who:

1. Completes state-designated coursework through a regionally-accredited institution of higher education for the areas of care and prevention of athletic injuries and coaching methodology or theory; and
2. Submits documentation of completion of first aid, health, and safety for coaches; fundamentals of coaching; and concussion in sports courses within the three years prior to application for the permit.

Required course work must be completed prior to the individual beginning their coaching responsibilities. Failure to complete required coursework will prohibit coaches from being able to participate in SDHSAA Region or State Events.

Graduate Credit

Through a partnership with the University of Sioux Falls (USF) and the SDHSAA, any individual who completes the NFHSLearn.com "Fundamentals of Coaching" and "First Aid, Health, and Safety" courses is now eligible to earn one semester hour of graduate credit through USF in addition to meeting the SDHSAA/DOE guidelines for coaching requirements.

By registering with USF through their workshop/outreach program, this one semester hour of graduate credit can be obtained for a fee of \$45.00 payable to USF. This fee is paid directly to USF and covers their expense; no financial gain is realized by any other organization, including the SDHSAA or NFHS. The University of Sioux Falls and the SDHSAA have extended their partnership to allow for any coach or educator to work on additional graduate credit offerings through the courses listed on NFHSLearn.com. This credit is above and beyond the opportunity for a graduate credit earned for the completion of "Fundamentals of Coaching" and "First Aid, Health, and Safety" courses that is still being offered.

Individuals now have the opportunity to earn one semester hour of graduate credit through USF for the completion of ANY 15 clock-hours worth of course completions through NFHSLearn.com. This clock hour option simply allows students to complete further continuing education opportunities through NFHSLearn.com, including those that are free of charge, and earn graduate credit for doing so.
